81 Chairman Scott called the worksession to order and turned the meeting over to County
82 Administrator Robert Hiss. Mr. Hiss turned the worksession over to Finance Director Ashley Anderson.

83 Mrs. Anderson reminded the Board we will have the budget and tax rate public hearings on April
84 26. We will adopt the tax rate that evening as well; the budget will be adopted on May 24. She stated that
85 open enrollment for employee health insurance would be from May 3 to May 15. She requested, and
86 received, consensus from the Board to move forward with the health insurance plans as proposed. Mrs.
87 Anderson and Mr. Hiss noted Human Resources is still exploring different wellness initiatives to assist with
88 fostering a culture of wellness within our organization.

89 Mr. Hiss then reviewed a memo he had sent out to the Board earlier which answered some of their
90 budget questions from the previous meeting:

- 91 • We might be able to provide a 10% discount with no joining fee at the YMCA for employees
92 as part of a wellness plan.
- 93 • We can already collect taxes directly from Airbnb's, but the funds are sent as a lump sum with
94 no distinction with regard to which property rentals the funds were for. The Commissioner
95 needs this information, so she is now collecting the taxes directly (many other localities have
96 also made this decision).
- 97 • Regarding the Tourism budget, Mr. Hiss stated that of the \$975,000 collected in transient
98 occupancy tax, \$696,000 must (by law) go towards Tourism. He said this tax covers the
99 expenses from the Tourism program.
- 100 • Of the \$3,825,701 in fund balance, \$1,284,000 was transferred to the Solid Waste Fund, and
101 \$2,504,000 was transferred to CIP.
- 102 • Both County and School debt that has rolled off is what made this proposed budget possible.

103 Mr. Hiss also requested, and received, consensus for pay parity for the Sheriff's Office, paramedics,
104 and EMT's. He noted staff is also still looking at the issues we are having at certain convenience sites with
105 people from outside Bedford bringing in their trash and adding to the transfer costs.

106 There followed a discussion between the Board and staff regarding the proposed budget and illegal
107 dumping at collection sites.

108 There being no further discussion for the worksession, Attorney Skelley called for a motion for the
109 closed session.

110 **Supervisor Tuck made a motion to enter into Closed Session pursuant to Section 2.2-3711 (A)**
111 **(29)** Discussion of the award of a public contract involving the expenditure of public funds, including

 207 **(8) Public Hearings & Presentations**

208 **(8a)** Supervisor Bansley presented the following Proclamation to Communications Director Judson
 209 Smith in recognition of May 16th – 22nd, 2021 as Emergency Medical Services Week:

210 **WHEREAS**, emergency medical services is a vital public service; and

211 **WHEREAS**, the members of emergency medical services teams are ready to provide lifesaving care
 212 to those in need 24 hours a day, seven days a week; and

213 **WHEREAS**, access to quality emergency care dramatically improves the survival and recovery rate
 214 of those who experience sudden illness or injury; and

252 WHEREAS, Bedford Victim Witness Program is hereby dedicated to supporting victims and
253 survivors in the aftermath of crime, building trust among our clients; collaborating with other service
254 providers, and engaging our community in response efforts;

255 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED that the Board of Supervisors of Bedford County does
256 hereby recognize April 18th through April 24th, 2021 as National Crime Victims’ Rights Week, and
257 reaffirms Bedford County’s commitment to creating a victim service and criminal justice response that
258 assists all victims of crime during Crime Victim’s Rights Week and throughout the year; and expressing
259 our sincere gratitude and appreciation for those community members, victim service providers and criminal
260 justice professional who are committed to improving our response to all victims of crime so that they may
261 find relevant assistance, support, justice and peace.

263 **(8c)** Lloyd Lenhart, Mark Thomas, Brad Furr, and Jacob McCain addressed the Board with an update
264 on Southside Electric’s storm response to Winter Storm Shirley back in February. Their presentation
265 included an overview of their construction standards for ice loading, emergency restoration/response plan,
266 safety performance during this event, continuing recovery efforts, et cetera. (The presentation in its entirety
267 will be kept on file in the County Administration office for public review.) There followed a brief question
268 and answer period with the Board.

270 **(8d)** County Attorney Patrick Skelley addressed the Board with an ordinance on behalf of Crisis
271 Response International requesting that its personal property be tax exempt. Attorney Skelley reminded the
272 Board this same group had addressed them last year to exempt their real property from taxation. He then
273 outlined the details of his request, which are also given in the resolution below.

274 The citizen comment portion of the public hearing was opened; there being no one desiring to
275 speak, this portion of the public hearing was closed.

276 **Supervisor Tuck made a motion to approve Ordinance #O 041221-02.**

277 WHEREAS, the County of Bedford has received an application from Crisis Response International
278 requesting that its personal property be tax exempt; and

279 WHEREAS, the application is for person property which is estimated to have a value of \$2,374.00,
280 and has been historically exempt from personal property taxation; and

281 WHEREAS, the purpose of the organization is to provide and train a volunteer base of disaster relief
282 workers, providing resources like emergency meals, down tree or debris removal, emotional support, and
283 disaster relief supplies free of charge. The CRI property provides a way for everyday citizens to get training
284 in disaster relief skills, CPR, Safe Food Handling, spiritual and emotional first-aid, light search and rescue,
285 and disaster preparedness. The CRI camp has been offered for use to Search and Rescue associations of
286 Virginia free of charge. CRI and the property will be of assistance to local first responders, local disaster
287 agencies active in disaster management as well as other volunteer organizations active in disaster. Crisis
288 Response International has a PTSD Post Traumatic Stress Disorder healing program for veterans and first

289 responders. Crisis Response International has mobile kitchens that can serve 5000 meals per day. The CRI
290 Camp property can serve as an evacuation center in times of disaster or fire.

291 **WHEREAS**, the Bedford County Board of Supervisors made the required findings pursuant to
292 Section 58.1-3651 of the Virginia Code and Section 17-3.5 of Chapter 17 “Taxation” of the Bedford County
293 Code; and

294 **WHEREAS**, in addition to the required findings, it is the finding of the Board of Supervisors that
295 the organization meets the general public need with the benefits that can be derived by the community at
296 large and that the benefits that will be received by the citizens of the County are equivalent to or exceed the
297 County’s loss in revenue from taxes.

298 **NOW THEREFORE**, it is the finding of the Board of Supervisors that Crisis Response International
299 is an organization that conducts charitable activities; that the organization does not have an annual alcoholic
300 beverage license nor will the organization have such a license; that the Directors, Officers, and Trustees of
301 the organization are paid in an amount commensurate with similar non-profit organizations; that none of
302 the net earnings of the organization inure to the benefit of any individual and that a significant portion of
303 the income is not from local and state grants; that the organization provides services that are for the common
304 good of the public; that no portion of the activities of the organization include legislative or political
305 campaigning for any office; and it is the finding of the Board of Supervisors that services provided by the
306 organization exceeds the potential loss of taxation from the organization.

307 **NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the Bedford County Supervisors that all of the personal
308 property of Crisis Response International shall be considered tax exempt pursuant to Section 58.1-3651 of
309 the Virginia Code and Section 17-3.5 of Chapter 17 “Taxation” of the Bedford County Code. This
310 exemption shall be effective immediately. Should the use of the property change in the future, the
311 continuance of the exemption shall be contingent on the continued use of the property in accordance with
312 the purpose for which the organization is classified.

319 **(9a)** Parks and Recreation Director Wyatt Woody addressed the Board with a resolution approving the
320 renaming of the Venhurst Drive property to Independence Park; the details of his request are outlined in
321 the resolution below.

322 **Supervisor Bansley made a motion to approve Resolution #R 041221-03.**

323 **WHEREAS**, the Bedford County Board of Supervisors purchased a 46-acre park property outside
324 of the Town of Bedford in 2019; and

325 WHEREAS, the Bedford County Parks and Recreation Department has been maintaining and
326 improving the property since it was purchased; and

327 WHEREAS, the Recreation Advisory Board met in August 2020 and voted unanimously to
328 recommend naming this property “Independence Park;” and

329 WHEREAS, this recommendation builds on the Town’s ‘Liberty’ theme and the park’s proximity
330 to Independence Boulevard; and

331 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Bedford County Board of Supervisors does hereby
332 concur with the recommendation of the Bedford County Recreation Advisory Board to rename the Venhurst
333 Drive Property to Independence Park.

339 (9b) County Attorney Patrick Skelley addressed the Board with a resolution authorizing the County
340 Administrator to enter into a contract for property reassessment services. He noted the Goode Fire and
341 Rescue Squad had approached the County about leasing their property to the County for a sum of \$1.00 per
342 year for 10 years. All current non-profit uses at the facility will continue, and the County will take over
343 maintenance, utilities, repairs, insurance, et cetera.

344 Vice-Chair Parker made a motion to approve Resolution #R 041221-04.

345 WHEREAS, Goode Volunteer Rescue Squad, Inc. (hereinafter “Goode”) is the owner of a parcel of
346 land containing 10.473 acre known as 9261 Forest Road that it acquired from Janeta Dudley by deed dated
347 25 January 1999 of record in the Clerk’s Office for the Circuit Court of Bedford County Virginia as Deed
348 Instrument No. 990001340; and

349 WHEREAS, the above-described property is being used for the purpose of providing emergency
350 medical care to the citizens of Bedford County; a voting precinct to meet the needs of the General
351 Registrar’s Office; a Public Safety facility to maintain a field office for the Bedford County Sheriff’s Office;
352 and for ongoing EMS promotions and civic activities by the group known as “Goode Area Ladies
353 Auxiliary”; and

354 WHEREAS, Goode desires to lease the above-described property to the County of Bedford, Virginia
355 for a term of ten (10) years, for the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) per year; and

356 WHEREAS, at the end of the lease term, the parties may either extend the lease term for an additional
357 10-year term, or the Goode Volunteer Rescue Squad may gift the facility and 10 +/- acres to the County;
358 and

359 WHEREAS, the County of Bedford, Virginia desires to lease said property.

360 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Bedford County Board of Supervisors authorizes
361 the County Administrator to execute a Memorandum of Understanding with Goode Volunteer Rescue

362 Squad, Inc. for real and personal property located at 9261 Forest Road containing 10.473 acres.

368 **(9c)** County Administrator Robert Hiss addressed the Board with a resolution authorizing him to enter
369 into a contract for property reassessment services. Mr. Hiss reviewed the details of the resolution below,
370 noting this is for the reassessment cycle we are required to conduct every four years. He noted that while
371 Wingate is not the least expensive proposal, their overall score on the scoring matrix was the highest when
372 the proposals were reviewed.

373 **Supervisor Tuck made a motion to approve Resolution #R 041221-05.**

374 **WHEREAS,** A comprehensive property reassessment is needed to maintain property appraisals
375 consistent with the fair market value; and

376 **WHEREAS,** a request for proposals (RFP) yielded three responses: Brightminds, Pearson's
377 Appraisal Service, and Wingate Appraisal Service; and

378 **WHEREAS,** after review of the RFP's the selection committee is recommending Wingate Appraisal
379 Service.

380 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** by the Bedford County Board of Supervisors, that the
381 County Administrator is authorized to enter into a contract with Wingate Appraisal Service.

389 **(11) Board Member Comments**

390 Supervisor Davis expressed his displeasure at not being allowed to publicly pray during the moment
391 of silence at the beginning of Board meetings.

392 Supervisor Tuck thanked staff, the Sheriff's Office, and our Emergency Services personnel for the
393 excellent job they have done with distributing the COVID-19 vaccines throughout the County.

394 Supervisor Johnson thanked the Sheriff's Office for the consistent trash pick-up on the roadsides;
395 he's received a lot of positive feedback from citizens. He also echoed Supervisor Tuck's comments
396 regarding the vaccine rollout.

397 Chairman Scott stated that while he agrees with Supervisor Davis regarding public prayer, we need
398 to follow the law. He noted that there was recently an incident in Florida where a local official offered a

399 prayer which would have forced Chairman Scott to leave the room if he had been present at that meeting.
 400 If we open the door to public prayer, we may have to contend with something we don't want to; rather than
 401 letting the cat out of the bag, we should do what we can do to keep things in order. Otherwise, it could
 402 quickly get out of hand.

403 Supervisor Bansley invited Supervisor Davis to join her and Supervisor Tuck in the hall outside
 404 the boardroom for their prayer group prior to the Board meetings. She said they pray from the heart for
 405 people and situations that need it. She also said he could join them with the Sheriff's Office once a month
 406 as they walk through the Town and pray in front of the County building, the Social Services building, the
 407 churches, et cetera. She said we should we should pray where we can instead of trying to fight a battle that
 408 has already been lost at in the highest courts.
